Thought for the Week

If you didn't know, I have been doing an MA in chaplaincy and Pastoral Work in DCU for the past year. Yesterday I am glad to report that I finished lecturers. I have been getting quite reflective over my experience in university, but my primary thought has been, one thing is ending...so what next? I think in our journeys we tend to reach a point and settle there, but I get the impression that God doesn't operate like that.

When Peter and John heard the news of Jesus body not being in the tomb, Peter ran with all this might to see this for himself, although John was obviously faster and beat him to the tomb! What strikes me about this section of the Easter story is that the disciples didn't stay at the tomb, they left it. There was nothing to see here other than rocks and folded linen cloths. They moved on to the next thing. Jesus wasn't there anymore; he was on the move. While Easter might have been celebrated two weeks ago, we still celebrate it now. I was delighted to see in John's PowerPoint from Sunday that he had an image of the garden tomb with the message, 'He is risen'. Jesus' resurrection is not meant for just one weekend in the year. It should be a daily thing we live out. The tomb is still empty! And we can move from it with that knowledge.

This coming Sunday we will be launching our updated vision for the church, which has taken months of work to get to this point. We will begin a four-week series looking at the 'pillars' of what we stand for as a church. I personally can't wait to get this series rolling, but what I am finding myself more interested in, is what we do after it. We might have a polished vision statement, we might have a new shiny logo, and a new PowerPoint background, but the work that comes after it is what interests me now. It is not just about the words on a poster, or the words from our mouth, but our actions. I hope you will join us on this four-week journey, but I also hope that we go from words to action, from thoughts to practicalities. I hope you will join us in asking the question ... so what next?

Dandelions





Things You Might Not Know About Dandelions - from Anita Sanchez, author of *The Teeth of the Lion*

Whether you love them or hate them, dandelions are among the most familiar plants in the world. They're one species that just about anyone can identify at a glance. Dandelions are, quite possibly, the most successful plants that exist, masters of survival worldwide.

Before the invention of lawns, people praised the golden blossoms and lion-toothed leaves as a bounty of food, medicine and magic. Gardeners often weeded out the grass to make room for the dandelions. But somewhere in the twentieth century, humans decided that the dandelion was a weed. Nowadays, they're also the most unpopular plant in the neighborhood – but it wasn't always that way.

Dandelions are good for your lawn. Their wide-spreading roots loosen hard-packed soil, aerate the earth and help reduce erosion. The deep taproot pulls nutrients such as calcium from deep in the soil and makes them available to other plants. While most think they're a lawn killer, dandelions actually fertilize the grass.


